OSHA determines which companies it will inspect by collecting injury and illness data. It stands to reason that those companies with the highest injury and illness rates are at the greatest risk of being inspected by OSHA.

OSHA is currently focusing its efforts on reviewing the accuracy of the Injury and Illness logs it receives from companies such as yours. OSHA believes this injury and illness data is currently underreported and is questioning the validity of the recent downward trend in injuries and illnesses.
